Introduction

Welcome to GEF IW:LEARN, a global project and a service dedicated to fostering collaboration, knowledge exchange, capacity development and partnership-building within the Global Environment Facility (GEF) International Waters (IW) focal area. Our goal is to support the GEF IW project portfolio in addressing common challenges related to the management of shared transboundary waters and their ecosystems, including river basins, lakes, groundwater, Large Marine Ecosystems (LMEs) and the ocean.

As a key connector among diverse stakeholders – such as project teams in executing agencies, implementing agencies, government project counterparts, decision makers, civil society, academia and the private sector - GEF IW:LEARN serves as a global hub for learning, exchange, capacity development and innovation on transboundary water management.

GEF IW:LEARN has grown from a pilot project in the early 2000s into a dynamic knowledge management hub and an essential crosscutting service for the GEF IW portfolio. Over the years, it has curated knowledge from more than 500 IW projects, transforming lessons learned into best practices, methodologies, and practical tools. By fostering learning, networking, and partnerships, IW:LEARN enhances the collective impact of the portfolio.

As a central knowledge platform, IW:LEARN hosts over 5,000 resources, including project results and flagship IW publications. It offers a suite of services ranging from knowledge management and capacity development to website and communication toolkits. The platform connects the IW portfolio through virtual and in-person training, twinning exchanges, and thematic dialogues. It also amplifies outreach of project news and achievements via monthly bulletins, targeted communications, and social media channels.

To date, IW:LEARN has delivered significant results, including over 60 global and regional training workshops, 37 project twinning exchanges, 12 regional transboundary dialogues, and 10 biennial International Waters Conferences (IWCs)—the portfolio's flagship learning event.

1. ABOUT GEF IW:LEARN?

1.1. What is IW:LEARN?

IW:LEARN stands for the GEF's International Waters Learning Exchange and Resource Network. It is a global knowledge sharing platform dedicated to collecting, curating and disseminating best practices, lessons learned, and innovative solutions across the GEF IW portfolio.

Beyond knowledge exchange, IW:LEARN develops practical guidance, methodologies, and capacity-development tools to help projects translate knowledge into tangible results with positive impact on the ground.

As a central hub for collaboration, IW:LEARN connects projects, practitioners, and regions, through a diverse range of activities that provide targeted support for improved management of shared transboundary water systems. Additionally, it links the GEF International Waters (GEF IW) projects to global processes and frameworks, and key regional and basin-level partners, ensuring they remain connected to broader international efforts.

1.2. What are IW:LEARN's Mission and Vision?

The mission of IW:LEARN is to facilitate knowledge exchange, foster collaboration, and provide resources that empower stakeholders within the GEF IW focal area, strengthening the impact of the GEF IW portfolio.







IW:LEARN envisions becoming the globally recognized and trusted platform that catalyzes positive change in transboundary water management by promoting collaboration, innovation, and experience sharing among stakeholders within the GEF International Waters and beyond.

1.3. What are the key objectives of IW:LEARN?

IW:LEARN aims to strengthen the impact and sustainability of the GEF International Waters (IW) portfolio by enabling projects to leverage collective knowledge, build partnerships, and align with global best practices. Its key objectives include:

- Enhancing Knowledge Management: Collects, curates, and disseminates lessons learned, best practices, and innovative solutions to improve transboundary water management.
- Supporting Capacity Development: Provides training, methodologies, and guidance to empower stakeholders in effectively implementing GEF IW projects
- Promoting Innovation & Best Practices: Supports the adoption of proven approaches while embracing new tools and methodologies.
- Facilitating Collaboration & Peer Learning: Connects project teams, practitioners, and decision-makers through exchanges, dialogues, and knowledge-sharing events.

- Supporting the GEF International Waters Focal Area Strategy: Supports the portfolio to align with evolving priorities and improve cooperative management of existing and new shared freshwater and marine ecosystems to achieve long-term environmental benefits.
- Strengthening Regional & Global Integration: Links GEF IW projects to international frameworks, regional governance processes, and key partners to promote coordinated action.

Further to these, in its 5th phase, IW:LEARN focuses on Small Island Developing States (SIDS) and addresses priorities such as the blue economy, integrated resource management from ridge-to-reef, protected areas, and climate resilience.

1.4. Who are we?

IW:LEARN is funded by the Global Environment Facility (GEF), implemented by the United Nations Development Program (UNDP), and the United Nations Environment Program (UNEP) and executed (Phase 4 and 5) by the Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission of UNESCO (UNESCO-IOC).

IW:LEARN runs in cycles and is currently in its 5th phase, from 2022 to 2026, also known as **IW:LEARN 5.**

Implementing modalities of IW:LEARN 5

The current phase of IW:LEARN is delivered through the Project Coordination Unit (PCU), with guidance by the Project Steering Committee (PSC).

As in every GEF IW project, the PSC formally supervises all activities undertaken by the PCU, providing strategic direction, guidance, and assessment to optimize the project's execution, ensuring its timely delivery, maximum relevance, and profound impact on the Portfolio. The PSC of IW:LEARN 5 includes the Development Partners, UNDP and UNEP, the Project Executive (GEF Secretariat), the Executing Agency, UNESCO-IOC, and 2 IW project representatives on a rotating basis.

Project Coordination Unit (PCU)

The PCU, headquartered at UNESCO-IOC in Paris, plays the central role in project coordination and implementation. It comprises the Project Coordinator, the Project Manager and the Administrative Assistant, while further experts support specific functions, such as Knowledge Management, Communications and IT services.


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2. WHAT DOES IW:LEARN OFFER?

IW:LEARN offers three main lines of service: i. Knowledge Management and Communication; ii. Capacity Development and iii. Networking and Partnership Building. The full structure is presented in the following diagram.



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2.1. KNOWLEDGE MANAGEMENT AND COMMUNICATION

2.1.1 Resources

The IW:LEARN website is a comprehensive repository, serving as a valuable resource for both current and past GEF IW projects. This platform facilitates access to the Project Database, Transboundary Diagnostic Analysis (TDA), and Strategic Action Programme (SAP) Databases, methodologies, manuals, notes, and many more relevant resources. Through these resources the IW:LEARN website acts as a hub for knowledge-sharing, enabling stakeholders to explore and contribute to the collective understanding of transboundary water management initiatives.

VII. Experience and Results Notes:

- Experience Notes help the transboundary water management community share its practical experiences to promote best practices and lessons learned. Experience Note is a case study that describes a project experience or innovation. It usually consists of three to six pages and provides details about successful practices, approaches, strategies, lessons, methodologies, etc., that emerge in the context of transboundary water management. They cover a range of topics related to project management, stakeholder involvement, technical issues, demonstration projects, and more. - <u>Results Notes</u> are targeted aggregations of key results of projects in terms of stress reduction, process, and change in environmental status in a concise way. Further guidance on the production of a GEF IW Results Note is available <u>here</u>.

VIII. <u>Synthesis Reports:</u> They further distill and integrate the key project findings and outcomes of project reports, summarizing and interpreting the information, and drawing conclusions for other types of readers, including policymakers.

Experience and Results Notes, and Synthesis Reports are available under <u>Documents</u> and can be filtered by region, waterbody thematic tag, and language. They can also be found on the respective project's profile page and via the Portfolio Visualization Tools.

2.1.2. Tools

The IW:LEARN website offers a suite of powerful tools to elevate water resources management and amplify the impact of GEF IW investments. Moreover, it offers a suite of tools to support the implementation of GEF IW projects.

I. Website toolkit: The Website Toolkit offers support for developing a dynamic content management system that is connected to and searchable through IW:LEARN's International Waters Information Management System. This network provides access to high-quality data and information and ensures that it is disseminated to a broader community of stakeholders. The Website Toolkit aligns with the GEF IW Website guidelines, which provide GEF IW projects with consistent guidance for designing and redesigning their project websites. A central feature of these guidelines is a comprehensive checklist that distinguishes mandatory from recommended items. Mandatory items are non-negotiable and must be implemented to meet IW:LEARN compliance requirements, while recommended items are optional, yet represent best practices for enhancing functionality, user experience and overall impact.

By adhering to these guidelines, projects can ensure that their websites meet IW:LEARN standards while maximizing effectiveness and accessibility.

2.2 CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT

Capacity development is a core function of IW:LEARN, aimed at enhancing the effectiveness and long-term impact of GEF IW projects worldwide. Through a multifaceted approach, IW:LEARN offers tailored opportunities for learning, knowledge exchange, and skill-building to strengthen stakeholder capacities in transboundary water management.

2.2.1. Trainings and Workshops

IW:LEARN facilitates regional <u>experience-sharing and training workshops</u> for GEF IW projects and partners in the Africa, Asia-Pacific, and Latin America—Caribbean regions. These workshops are based on cross-cutting themes facilitated by IW:LEARN project partners.

2.2.2. Online Courses

As part of the GEF IW:LEARN's capacity development initiative, free <u>online courses</u> are offered on iwlearn.net. These courses are developed by IW:LEARN, LME:LEARN, and partners. Explore topics such as transboundary freshwater governance, Large Marine Ecosystems Assessment and Management, Sustainable Tourism and Stakeholder Networking for SIDS and more.

2.2.3. Twinning

IW:LEARN facilitates learning exchanges, known as <u>twinning</u>, among GEF IW and other partners. These exchanges provide practical solutions to common management and technical challenges while fostering collaboration among project teams. Twinning typically involves on-site visits, where one project exchanges with another to share knowledge, expertise, and best practices.

2.2.4. Expertise

IW:LEARN is currently compiling rosters of experts from the International Waters Community to respond to portfolio needs for expertise.

2.3 NETWORKING AND PARTNERSHIP BUILDING

2.3.1 International Waters Conferences (IWCs)

The GEF <u>IWC</u> is the signature learning event for the GEF International Waters portfolio of projects and partners aiming to facilitate cross-sectoral and portfolio-wide learning and experience sharing. The latest edition, <u>IWC10</u>, convened nearly 400 participants, including GEF IW project managers, institutional stakeholders from beneficiary countries, non-governmental and civil society organizations, transboundary and regional management institutions, UN agencies, Development Banks, Intergovernmental Organizations, and the private sector. Collectively, they represented more than 90 active GEF IW projects, from 72 countries and various GEF Agencies.

2.3.2. Global & Regional events

IW:LEARN supports participation in <u>global and regional dialogues</u> and policy meetings, such as the World Water Forum, the Stockholm World Water Week, the UN Ocean Conferences, and others, to showcase portfolio results via side events and exhibitions, as well as to build partnerships between GEF interventions and with actors outside the focal area.

2.3.3. Project Matchmaking

Project Matchmaking is an envisaged service by IW:LEARN 5 building on the concept of the Learning Exchange Service Centre (LESC), launched in IW:LEARN 4. LESC served as a market place for coordinating and sharing learning activities offered by our partner network and GEF IW projects, whereas the project matchmaking service will help identify partners and knowledge providers to support existing and new projects.

3. HOW CAN YOU ENGAGE WITH IW:LEARN?

All GEF IW projects allocate 1% of their overall budget for portfolio learning and sharing. This fund allocation should be utilized for:

- Participation in IWCs: Recommended minimum attendance of the GEF IW project manager/coordinator and two project country representatives;
- Participation in regional and global IW:LEARN workshops;
- Elaboration of at least 2 Experience Notes;
- Cost-sharing of other IW:LEARN activities, as needed.

3.1 How is your project expected to contribute?

- I. Fulfill obligations by sharing essential documentation, significant reports, and key knowledge management products:
- Essential documentation: PIF, Project Document, Mid-term and Terminal Evaluation Reports;

- Technical and management documents: TDA/SAP, etc.;
- A minimum of two Experience Notes;
- Knowledge management products developed by the project.

II. Contribute to the Portfolio Bulletin by sharing compelling stories, noteworthy news, and details about upcoming events. Anyone may easily sign up to receive the bulletin monthly and find previous issues on iwlearn.net/news.

III. Regularly update contact of the project to PCU and important updates and changes in the project status.

3.2 How can your project engage?

- Actively participate in IW:LEARN training sessions, workshops, conferences, and events. Projects are invited to make their own presentations at workshops and may also suggest other partners to invite to the workshop or consultants to present on various topics.
- Foster exchanges with the IW:LEARN PCU and connect with peers.
- Engage in the IWCs: co-organise sessions, contribute to other sessions, feature results and innovations in the exhibition area, submit films and other outputs in the competitions, etc.
- Participate and contribute to regional training sessions, including by featuring their experience and expertise on various themes.
- Explore twinning exchanges and collaborate on proposals. Projects participating in twinnings are asked to complete a Mission Report and Experience Note after their exchange.

- Utilize available tools, including project visualization and Geonode for project-related data and spatial information.
- Contribute to manuals, methodologies, and guides, providing inputs, feedback, and suggestions, and contributing case studies or documentation.
- Project managers and GEF IW staff are invited to give feedback and suggestions on the Project Management Manual or submit case studies, example ToRs, or other documentation supporting the information in the manual to be included in the document library.
